Murdercycles MC Hot Rod Riot

On June 10, 2010, B.A.A.C. attended the Hot Rod Riot 5 hosted by Murdercycles MC at the Four Town Fairgrounds in Ellington, CT. The event features radical hot rods and custom motorcycles and gave us an opportunity to don our rockabilly best! The event featured a GM Futurliner owned by Peter Pan buslines, which doubled as the stage for the rockabilly band that performed for the event. The GM

Futurliners were a group of stylized buses designed in the 1940s by Harley Earl for General Motors. They were used in GM's Parade of Progress, which traveled the United States exhibiting new cars and technology. The Futurliners were used from 1940 to 1941 and again from 1953 to 1956. A total of 12 were built, and 9 were still known to exist as of 2007.

Quarterly Contribution Summary

From July – Sept. 2010 B.A.A.C. contributed a total of \$4,666.50 and assisted the care of 22 animals in need. The following is a summary of our contributions this quarter.

BIG BEN – Greenville, SC

A monetary contribution was made to assist BIG BEN. He was brought to Greenville County Animal Control from the Emergency Clinic after being picked up as a stray. He was thoroughly evaluated and it was discovered he has an old leg injury. His leg is shattered in several places and cannot be repaired. His leg needs to be amputated because it is a non-functioning leg that is keeping him from running and playing. Big Ben was rescued from the shelter last week and is being treated at a vet for every parasite known.

PETE - Santee, SC

A monetary contribution was made to assist sweet 3 year old Pete, a Pekingese burned from having hot oil poured over his body. Pete is at a vet being treated for his terrible burns and also for heartworms and several other parasites.

SCOUT - Opelika AL

A monetary contribution was made to assist Scout. This poor girl came into Heard County Animal Control with a grievous injury. Her foot had been caught in a steel trap and the vet will amputate the toes but if the infection has progressed too far into her foot he will have to amputate the whole leg.

MIDNIGHT - Camden, SC

A monetary contribution was made to assist Midnight. This sweet 9 month old shepherd mix pup was tied up with horribly embedded collar. Midnight has lived her entire life of 7 months tied up in someone's back yard in Clinton, SC. The people got her, put a one inch webbed puppy collar on her, gave her food and water and then forgot about her.

WILL – Camden, SC

A monetary contribution was made to assist Will. This incredible little Fox Terrier

was brought to Walter Crowe Humane Society. He came in with severe neurological problems and was blind and later determined to be deaf.

PRECIOUS – Evans, GA

A monetary contribution was made to assist Precious, a sweet dog that was severely emaciated. Every bone in its body sticking out. This poor guy found this dog in Augusta, GA.

LUNA – Colchester, CT

A monetary contribution was made to spay a female pit bull, Luna.

LUCIEN (LUCKY) – Dayton, OH

A monetary contribution was made to assist with the vetting of Lucien. This poor guy was left in a basement after the family moved away. He was found and sent to an animal clinic in Dayton, OH to be nursed back to health.

JEN – Mom and Five pups

A monetary contribution was made to assist with Jen and her puppies. She had a dislocated hip and her five puppies had worms.

TANK – East Haven, CT

A monetary contribution was made for Tank who was found wandering the streets with a broken leg. He was not taken in for medical care, so the leg healed incorrectly.

LAINIEY - Bolton, CT

A monetary contribution was made to assist Lainiey who was rescued from a home in Meriden, CT at only 5 weeks old. Lainiey was loaded with worms and it was discovered that she had broken both her elbows by jumping off the stairs of a deck.

CHARLIE - Henderson, NC

A monetary contribution was made to assist Charlie in the hopes that he would make a full recovery from injuries that were sustained in a severely neglectful situation. He was brought in severely matted and it was found that he had infections and severe muscle damage from he matted fur pulling his skin from his body. Unfortunately, shortly after trying to be saved, Charlie succumbed to his injuries. RIP Charlie.

A monetary contribution was made to assist Jersey a precious red nose Staffordshire Terrier. At less than 2 years old she has been through more than any dog deserves to. When she was just 2 months old she was traded for a friend's cell phone. She was adopted then lost the only home she knew. She came down with pneumonia and survived and is now looking for a forever home.

LOCKE – Willington, CT

Monetary contributions have been made for Locke's boarding while he waits for a furever home. He is a

B.A.A.C. foster dog and can be seen on our petfinder page.

HERO (a.k.a. Kobe), Prospect-Wolcott Veterinary Hospital, Prospect, CT

Kobe was surrendered to B.A.A.C. to place in a home that could provide the love and care he desperately needed. Kobe (now named Hero), is a deaf boxer who had been neglected and suffered from an ear infection, was malnourished and had a few cancerous tumors. The ear infection was treated, the cancer was removed and the wonderful couple that adopted him are putting healthy weight on him.

I haven't been to Chicks in West Haven for a hot dog during the summer in a decade!

When Cindy and I first started Bikers Against Animal Cruelty 3 years ago, we thought naively I might add, that it would, along with helping animals, help dispel stereotypes of bikers. Maybe help soften the image a bit. That part of our mission hasn't really panned out so well.

Over the summer we had our annual motorcycle rodeo and adoption event in East Hartford. It was 2 or 3 hours before the start of the event and a bunch of us were setting things up and East Hartford's finest rolls in. Asking what kind of event it was? Who was hosting it? Would there be motorcycle clubs there? Would they be asking these questions of ANY other group of people were setting up at the Knights of Columbus hall on a Sat in July? My guess is no. Even after explaining that it was a charity event to raise money for animal cruelty victims they proceeded to cruise in and out of the one entrance to the party all day, stopping traffic at the gate, just to sneak a peak. At what exactly still remains a mystery. They sat in the parking lot and down the street. I mean how does this make B.A.A.C. look to a first time supporter? The day went off without any gang wars, drug smuggling or arms dealing, much to the surprise of the EHPD, or maybe to their disappointment. It's just sad that this is the way it is unless, of course, you ride with any of the many police motorcycle clubs. Then you are fine. We all know cops would never do anything illegal. They just watch Sons of Anarchy and play biker on the weekend. What could be safer than that?

Us, we were just trying to raise some money of animals that have been abused and or neglected, you know, typical biker scum. What a joke.

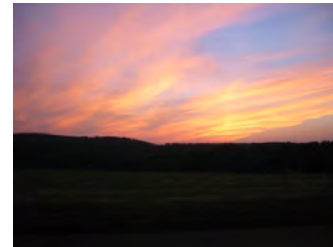

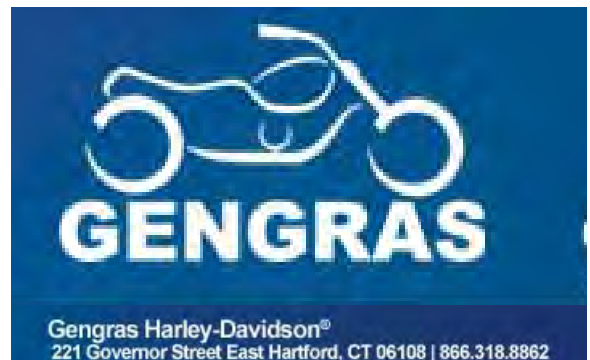

“Homewrecker”

This 2002 Sportster 1200XL owned by Jan Trendowski is the product of a broken home. Sold as part of a divorce settlement, Jan claims he got a great deal on it. “The guy had to sell it or turn it over to the Ex.”, said Trendowski, “Couldn’t beat the price.” The former mechanic didn’t leave the bike stock for long. Nearly unrecognizable as a Sportster now, the bike has a Fatbob tank, wide glide front end, spoked wheels, and an alligator skin Badlands seat (fake, of course). The rear is an inch down while the front tubes are 2 inches over. The ’65 sportster bars are on 4 inch risers, giving the bike a pulled back look. Most of the parts that could be chromed, are. The paint is a concession to riding, however. Fifteen dollars worth of spray paint and the tank was road worthy.

As is often said, beauty is only skin deep, but ugly is down to the bone. When you start digging into this sporty, things do get very ugly very quickly. “I actually started with the engine, as that is the part that interested me. The current build includes 1250 NHRS jugs housing CP forged pistons matched to Buell Thunderstorm heads. “I got the heads from a lady who was cleaning out her ex husband’s storage box.” Anderson N4 cams push Crane adjustable rods into Total Performance roller rockers and apparently oversize valves. Breathing is through a V Twin air filter system with external oil bleed into a rejetted Mikuni HSR42 carb. The exhaust is chopped drag pipes into Cycle Shack slip-ons. The Dyna single fire ignition directs a Dyna performance coil. While the bike is running rich now, the winter plans include an Innovate Lamda gauge computer sensor along

with Stage 2 porting treatment on the Thunderstorm heads. Once the gauge is in, the entire system should dial in nicely.

The project was sidetracked for a while when Trendowski bought a 2001 Dyna to ride during construction. “People asked me why have two bikes and I told them that one Harley didn’t bother my wife enough. I pulled into the driveway on the Dyna and said ‘What do you think, honey?’ When I woke up in the ER, I knew that I had reached the level of irrita-

tion I was striving for.” The Dyna was not meant to be, however, and after losing a jousting match with a 16 year old in a pickup, it was back to finishing the Sporty.

The bike is fast. “Riding is a lot of fun, but stopping is problematic as you have to pull your lips back off your ears push them back into the front of your face.”
